


To Our Readers...

This is the Spring RQ?!

That's what we said. Just when the streets of our hometown were being turned upside down by anti-war protests, just when we most need a shot of magic — RQ has run so low on funds that our only solution was to home-produce this 18-page newsletter.

At our Spring Retreat last month, RQ had to face some harsh realities. Not only had we come up over \$8000 short for 2002 (compared to \$3500 in 2001), but Reclaiming's coffers were unexpectedly low following a smaller-than-usual Spiral Dance this past Samhain.

The newsletter you are reading is one result of this shortfall. We considered skipping an issue altogether, but it seemed especially important at this time to publish something, even if it's a big step back from our usual issues.

Subscribers will get an additional issue — this newsletter will not count against your four-issues. But as you can see, we urgently need your support. This is the moment to make that additional donation you've thought about. Your contribution at this critical moment will in large measure determine the future of the magazine. If you want RQ to resume publication, we need to hear from you now.

At the retreat, we reviewed the past six years of Reclaiming Quarterly, particularly at a ritual where we did bibliomancy, opening magically-selected issues at random and letting the magazine speak to us. Some of the results were inspiring, some amusing, and a few disturbing. Harshest of all, we had to face to possibility that RQ as we know it may have reached the end of the line.

On Sunday afternoon, we did a tarot reading around the question, "Where does RQ — the magazine, not the cell-members — want to go?" Having already done an exercise where we keyed issues of the magazine to the major arcana of the tarot deck, we decided to draw only majors for our reading. The result is portrayed on the front cover.

We'll leave it to you to work out the detailed reading, but we had to be struck by the Tower shaking underneath us, Death in the "fears" position, Justice in the "hopes" spot, and Strength ahead of us.

THE MOST exciting idea to emerge from the retreat was to make each issue of RQ a spell. We want to weave our usual blend of magic and grassroots activism into more than a magazine. Having invoked Squat, Brook warned, it is important to leave an offering. He recommended three pennies.

"Hail Mary full of grace, Help us find a parking space."

This prayer to Mary, which has a similar purpose, was an alternative suggested by Brook at the same time. Mary, who succeeded against formidable odds in finding a place to have her baby, may be able help find a place for our car.

Personally, I invoke with, "Oh, Parking Goddess" and a low tone as I search for a place to park my rather large blue vehicle. I usually leave a quarter as offering, reasoning that if the Parking Goddess is indeed the goddess of the homeless, this offering might be a tool for her to help her folk. I have to say that since starting this practice a little more than a year ago, my parking karma has significantly improved.



UP UNTIL two years ago, I didn't own an American flag. I refused to fly one outside my house or put it on my car even though I have supported several friends who chose to join the armed forces. With all of my shadow issues, I had made the flag a symbol for the kind of power I wanted to knock down and reconstruct.

This Winter, I marched in the D.C. Peace rally with the Pagan Cluster. I proudly walked between two ex-Special Forces soldiers wearing their green berets and fatigue jackets. We held a whopper of an American flag and one of the guys carried a piece of the magical web weaving. How did this shift in perspective occur?

It took a man who retired after 25 years in the Special Forces to redefine the stars and stripes for me. He gifted me with an American flag two years ago, and I fly it in his honor on Veterans Day. On the 4th of July, I fly it for myself. As Witches, the two of us see all life intrinsically connected, energy across lifetimes deeply interwoven, no light without dark, no gift without responsibility. I've come to a new understanding of the responsibility I hold in exchange for the gift of being born American.

The red and white stripes on the American flag signify my birthright as a revolutionary. Those original 13 states set an expectation for our country that we speak up for freedom and democracy. Indeed, Thomas Jefferson said that a healthy democracy should have a revolution every 25 years. Perhaps we've taken care of that with presidential elections every four years. Perhaps we're overdue for

The stars on our flag represent the people of this country — not the government. One star for every state. There's a growing schism between the government and the people they're elected to

represent. Maybe that's why the policy makers hide behind our flag and wave it around so often, Well, that's our flag. Like the symbolic pink triangle that was

reclaimed, I'm stepping forward to claim the stars and stripes back for positive change.

I disagree with the government of this country frequently. I'm fortunate that I can do so and still retain my citizenship and my life. I'm aware of far


agreed to serve.

Last month. my 6-year-old daughter designed a flag for her Brownie Scout project. It turned out to be a round peace sign with the

stars and stripes behind it. I used one of those magnetic car flags, some black electrician's tape and scissors to make one for our car. Now everyone in conservative Hanover County, Virginia knows that we're "peaceful patriots."

> We have resources, means, and good education in this country. As a result we're in a position to do a lot of good — or a lot of harm. Too often, government loses touch with what the people want and makes big mistakes in our name. Driving home on Martin Luther King, Jr. day, I was reminded that government didn't decide to implement Civil Rights. It was a unified uprising on the part of the people that forced change to occur.

For now, help build a house, sponsor a child, volunteer for a non-profit, or send livestock to a developing country. We can redistribute the resources of our own country's wealth even when our government doesn't seem to have the sense to do so on our behalf. We can find a way to send education and aid instead of munitions to third world countries. I claim the birthright of an American to be a revolutionary. I claim the right of continued on page 16

THE MONEY TABOO

As we began work on this issue of RQ, our projected theme was labyrinths and meditations. But we also had blocked out space for an intriguing article that had come to us from one of our readers: "The Money Taboo." As cell-members read the piece, we talked about the possibility of saving the article and building a future theme section around it.

When finances forced us to scale back the Spring issue to this newsletter, we decided to hold the labyrinth material for a future issue (probably Fall 2003). But "The Money Taboo" seemed more timely than ever. We present it here, in hopes that it triggers discussion and action in the Reclaiming community.

IN A CULTURE of immanence where all things are considered sacred, why do we still consider money to be profane? All about we see powerful Witches doing incredible work on issues big and small, personal and political. But if the subject. of money comes up, many of us fall strangely silent. It is a sticking point something we're not comfortable discussing. It is something that we're not comfortable working with in circle. It is something we rarely address. But money is inextricably tied to spiritual growth. How could it not be? It is how we trade our life energy for the energies of other people, exchanging one of our most precious possessions — the time that we have remaining in our lives and the freedom to use that time however we need to use it. We need to bring money out of the closet, work on our problems with it, and break the money taboo.

The discomfort we often experience communicating about money manifests in many ways. Sometimes this discomfort causes us to lie outright. For example, a friend asks us how our business is going and we lie and say, "Great!" In fact, we're suffering just like nearly every other business due to the economic recession, but it is taboo to show financial weakness. And so we actually lie about it.

A common problem for Witches is

sliding scale class fees where "no one is turned away for lack of funds." How do you know what amount you "should" pay? What if you make a considerable income but you are having a particularly tight month? Is it okay to not pay at all? What if you think too much is being charged for the class or event? What if you have some money saved up, but it's earmarked for some other use? What does "lack of funds" really mean? How many of us can frankly discuss these issues with an instructor without being uncomfortable?

Talking openly about how much we earn at our jobs is also considered gauche. How many of us have been questioned by someone about our income level and felt awkward? We don't know what to say. Why is this? Why do we not want to reveal our income to others?

One area where the silence has been broken for many is in "who picks up the check?" It wasn't that long ago that the only socially accepted thing to do on a heterosexual date was for the man to pay for dinner. That shift in societal values only really started a few decades ago and the transition is still not complete. But most of us can comfortably talk about splitting the bill without it being too uncomfortable and awkward. Many of us can comfortably insist on paying our share, and only our share. Just as we have learned to do that,

we can learn to break the silence about money in other areas of our lives.

WHERE THERE IS FEAR...

So what is the root cause of these varying forms of silence about money? They all involve some level of fear. It is fear of being judged by others as better or worse. It is fear of others classifying us as "rich" or "poor" or "failing" or "unfair". It is fear of being stereotyped and stuck in a box by those around us. And in addition to fear, it is guilt. Income level guilt is prevalent: "A billion people live on less than a dollar a day, and I make a hundred times that."

We can use the discomfort and guilt and fear. We can use them as road signs. These things point to areas inside us that are in conflict. They show us where those conflicts are, and what values are in conflict. And by realizing what our internal conflicts are, we can begin to resolve them. The result is a stronger and more powerful self.

One of the hardest things for us is to answer questions honestly. But in coming to terms with our hesitations and speaking openly about our financial situations when it is appropriate, we can experience a snowball effect of increased honesty among the people around us. It can encourage a stronger circle of allies who can discuss money problems, who can ask each other for help with their weak areas, and who can learn from the successes and mistakes of each other.

Bringing money out of the closet helps us all.

Facing the fears of what others may think of us is hard. What is easy to do is to look at it from the other perspective. We can't stop others from judging us, but we can stop judging others. How often do we put other people in boxes when we learn about their income? Rich. Poor. Wasteful. Ruling class. Pitiful. Beneath us. How often do we make judgments about what we think another person should be able to afford? Or judgments about what we should be able to afford in our tireless addiction to keeping up with the Joneses?

The key is to remember that each of us is on a different path. Each of us is at a particular place on our path. We cannot sit in judgment about where another person should be and what issues they should have solved by now. They are struggling with precisely what they need to be struggling with. They are doing the work that they need to do and the work that they are able to do. We don't know their situation. We cannot presume to. When we see the external appearances of how the Joneses live, we cannot really know their complete situation. It is very different from ours. Apple to apple comparisons cannot be applied. We certainly cannot use guilt and intimidation to coerce people to change their lifestyles to be closer to our own ideals.

... THERE IS POWER

HERE IS A situation that we have all experienced in one form another. A friend has problems holding down a job or spending within his means. He is a Witch. While going through a particularly hard time financially, he decides to work some magic to bring more money into his life. His work with money ends there. But he is still not comfortable talking about it. He isn't better off when he actually gets more money. His desire for more money does indeed get fulfilled. But that wasn't actually what he needed. His money problems are still there. Working on our money issues must entail more than merely asking the universe for more of

How can we change our perception

of money and our relationship to money into something positive? Where do we even start?

There is another dominant way of thinking in our society that believes "Money is the root of all evil." Many of us grew up with that view, and it is very hard to change it. That is a view where money is one of the worst profanities. It is certainly not life affirming. This is a tradition of money guilt — that much is obvious.

Many of us feel this way still. We think about money as being a "necessary evil". We hate it for the power it has over us, and for how it controls every aspect of our lives. Wouldn't the world be better if we

> could just go back to bartering for what we needed?

> Money can be used to control others and great harm can be done with it. It is not by itself evil. It has power and that power can be corrupted and perverted. It can have power over us if we do not confront it. But the power of money can also be used for immeasurable good. By changing our view from money being evil to money being sacred, we can't help but use it in a life affirming

A great concern of magical people in many cultures is power. Gaining power. Conserving power. Being powerful. Many of the ethics of that sort of power apply to money as well. Are we careful about harming others when we use our

monetary power? Are we careful with our use of monetary power, considering the effects and ethics of every use of it? Do we conserve our energies by avoiding debt? Do we wield our financial power with a solemn sense of responsibility? These practices are incredibly empowering. Having the discipline to save money for a rainy day, retirement, and for uses that contribute

to our life's purpose is important power building. When we conserve our money and use it for what is truly important to our lives, our lives become more passionate and amazing and purposeful.

Let's go back for a moment to that Witch who crafts a spell for getting more money. Think about all it takes to become a powerful Witch. What if you naively thought that it was as simple as casting a spell to "get more power" and then sat back and waited? Too often that's exactly what Witches do to deal with their money issues. Spells to get more money may manifest in many ways. But more money rarely helps the bulk of our money issues. It probably makes most of them worse.

MONEY IS SACRED

Money is not profane. It is crucial to learn to view money as sacred. If a tree is sacred and a baby is sacred and if even baby shit is sacred - if everything is sacred — money certainly must be as well. It is part of the stuff of life.

Money is among our most sacred things because it is actually a representation of life force itself. The key to understanding this is to take a step back and to ask, what is money really? How do I get it? How do I use it? A particularly insightful question to ask is, "How much do I make?" Your answer will most likely be something like, "I make \$10 per hour," or, "I make \$45,000 per year." And what that answer would clearly show is that you exchange time itself for money — the time remaining in your life. While it would be going too far to say that money actually is life force, it certainly represents it and is a primary means by which we exchange our life's energy with that of other people. It is often how we exchange our life's energy for the energy of the Earth itself. How can money not be a key spiritual aspect of our lives?

When we receive money from our jobs — from exchanging our precious and finite time and energy for it - we don't hoard it. We use some of that money for our survival needs and some for special treats. Maybe we save some

or invest in a business or in education. When we spend money, we give it to other people in exchange for them using their precious time and energy to serve us. We pay people to bake us bread, build us homes, teach us, pave our roads, design our web sites, and make us chocolate bars.

When we incur debt we literally owe parts of our lives: time that we have not yet lived that must be given up to repay that debt. "Wage slave" takes on a whole new meaning. What is paying for a home loan, or a car loan, or a student loan, or a credit card but literal



indentured servitude? How much of hating our job is due to that knowledge in our bones that we are slaves unable to escape our masters?

How much money (i.e. time) does it take you to live the lifestyle you are living? Many expenses don't serve us, like that light bulb that is on in the other room. How much less would it take if you cut out most of the waste? How much would it take to meet your needs if you wanted to spend every possible moment working on the truly important things in your life?

We all know how "voting with dollars" affects the environment and society. When we purchase gasoline, we contribute to air pollution. When we purchase a hamburger, we are eating higher on the food chain than is

sustainable. But what about how "voting with dollars" affects our own lives? When we spend money on something that is good for us, that helps us grow, and that contributes to our community, we are affirming life. We are focusing our life energy on adding to our lives and growth. What about when we waste our money? It does not add to our lives to spend money to power a light bulb nobody is using. In fact, it hurts us twice: once when we spent our time working for the money that we wasted, and again with the negative social and environmental consequences that come from energy overconsumption. Every expense we incur is paid for by a bit of our lives. Time lost at work, commuting, and job training is time that we never get back. Except in the rare cases where people have jobs that are perfectly matched with their individual paths in life, that time spent is time lost — time they cannot devote to what really matters.

When we waste, we literally pay for that indiscretion with our lives.

Imagine that a rich relative left you an inheritance. There is enough money that you never have to work again if you keep your expenses low by sharing an apartment with roommates, using the bus instead of owning a car, cooking your meals at home, and so on. What would you do with your time? Would you work at all? Learn to play the piano? Backpack around Europe? Crisscross the country attending anti-war demonstrations? Be a full time parent? Volunteer in a soup kitchen? Where do your passions lie? Why aren't you following those passions right now? Why aren't you living that life? Is your path in life more important than living a lifestyle that obscures it? Can you make some changes to your lifestyle to rebuild your life around your passions? Will you?

Money is a sacred representation of life force. We need to explore this terrain and be able to speak openly about it, without fear and without judgment. We need to bring money out of the closet.

Spring's Delight Fritt

FRESHLY PICKED asparagus is an early Spring treat. The smell, taste, and texture of pencil-thin stalks that were harvested just hours before reminds us of delicious things to come as the ground warms up and vegetables are planted.

To grow asparagus in a home garden is a commitment. The asparagus crowns are planted in a sandy trench, slowly filled in with soil, and then carefully watered and tended for up to three years before a decentsized crop will be ready to pick and eat. The plants don't like to be moved about, so once you pick a spot and plant them, be prepared to leave them there.

What we eat as asparagus are the young, tender shoots of a member of the lily family. If you left a few shoots on the plant they would grow into lacy, fern-like fronds up to five feet high.

I haven't planted asparagus in my yard yet - I haven't decided on a permanent spot — so my bunches are instead purchased from the Farmer's market. When you buy asparagus, look for thin (a little larger than a pencil) bright green, firm stalks. Try to get them small, fresh, and tender.

A great way to enjoy asparagus is steamed until just tender. You could eat it plain or with a little bit of butter or margarine as a side dish or a snack, but to me Springtime asparagus is best in a

frittata. Serve yourself a slice on a cheery plate and eat it outside in the crisp Spring air.

- 1) Preheat the broiler and get an oven-safe skillet. Gather four bowls, a cutting board, a knife, measuring cups and spoons, and a steamer basket and pot.
- 2) Wash asparagus and cut off the root ends. Steam until just tender, 5-7 minutes. When cool enough to touch, chop

- 3) Chop herbs finely. Mix eggs, herbs and dash of salt and pepper. Set aside.
- 4) Wash onions. Grate cheeses and chop one onion. Mix and set it aside.
- 5) Chop remaining onions into 1/4" pieces. Sauté in oven-safe pan with canola oil until tender. Put into the last bowl.
- 6) Now for the fun part. Melt butter/ margarine in the oven-safe pan. Swirl it

around in the pan so it's well-coated. Pour in egg mixture and cook over low to medium heat until the eggs begin to firm up. The eggs will be somewhat runny on top. Take pan off heat, sprinkle the asparagus on top of the eggs, then sprinkle the onions. Top it off by sprinkling the cheese and reciting a spell:

> Bright green life after Winter's dark, Tender earthy shoots of Spring. With fertile eggs provide the spark, Creative possibilities bring! As Earth warms and thaws cold ground, May spirit delight and joy abound. Blessed be.

7) Pop the pan under the broiler for 3 to 4 minutes so the eggs puff up and the top turns a golden brown color. Take it out of the oven and serve immediately. Breathe deep and enjoy!

a pinch of salt

4 large eggs

INGREDIENTS

1/4 c. grated sharp cheddar cheese 1 Tbsp. Parmesan cheese 6 green onions 2 tsp canola oil

1/2 lb. tender young asparagus

2 Tbsp. fresh tarragon (2 tsp. dried)

1 Tbsp. fresh dill or 1 tsp, dried dill

a dash of salt and pepper

2 tsp butter or margarine

into 1/2" pieces.

2004 Dandelion Gathering

All-Reclaiming Gathering Set for Spring '04

THE RECLAIMING Witchcamp Spokescouncil is asking its communities if they will support a gathering of Reclaiming folks in Spring of 2004 with the following intent:

To celebrate, tend the hearth, dream the future, and nurture the wild seed.

The gathering is called the Dandelion Gathering, and is to be open to all who are called by the intention and who agree to respect the Reclaiming Principles of Unity.

Something like this has been on and off the agenda for a long time. In 1999 Spokescouncil did reading after reading trying to find a date for a gathering to be called the GROTTO; and reading after reading said "No - that would be the wrong date."


Why 2004?

AT THE OCTOBER 1998 Spokescouncil meeting in Vermont there were 14 people, all North American, representing seven camps. (Germany was represented by a North American teacher.)

By October 2002 in Austin there were 21 attendees, four from Europe, including spokes from eight camps, an invited elder, a Guidance Council representative, and scribes and facilitators from the local community. The room was full compared to 1998.

And yet lots of folks weren't there. Three camps new to the Spokes process didn't yet have spokes in attendance: Tejas Village camp, New York camp, and Winter camp in the midwest. We knew of other camps or camp-like events outside of the Spokescouncil process, like the Cascadia camp, and Wild Ginger, and Witchlets in the Woods, and even the possibility that the accidental DC Prison Witchcamp might spark a permanent event (with

Spring Equinox

This is the time of Spring's return; the joyful time, the seed time, when life bursts forth from the earth and the chains of Winter are broken. Light and dark are equal: it is a time of balance, when all the elements within us must be brought into a new harmony. Kore, the Dark Maiden, returns from the Land of the Dead, cloaked in the fresh rain, with the sweet scent of desire on her breath. As She dances, despair turns to hope, sorrow to joy, want to abundance. A favorite chant is:

> She changes everything She touches, And everything She touches, changes

In many locales, children are a special part of this ritual, and a hunt for colored eggs follows.

Beltane/May Day

This is the time when sweet desire weds wild delight. The Maiden of Spring and the Lord of the Waxing Year meet in the greening fields and rejoice together under the warm sun. The shaft of life is twined in a spiral web, and all of nature is renewed. We meet in the time of flowering, to dance the dance of life.

Summer Solstice

This is the time of the rose: blossom and thorn, fragrance and blood. Now on the longest day of the year, light triumphs, and yet begins to decline into dark. So the Lord of Light dies himself, and sets sail across the dark seas of time, searching for the isle of light that is rebirth. We turn the Wheel and share his fate, for we have planted the seeds of our own changes, and to grow we must accept even the passing of the sun.
