Should Black students form a union in order to have a voice in the Bosse High School system? Are Black students discriminated against in a sly, slick, and wicked, wicked way?

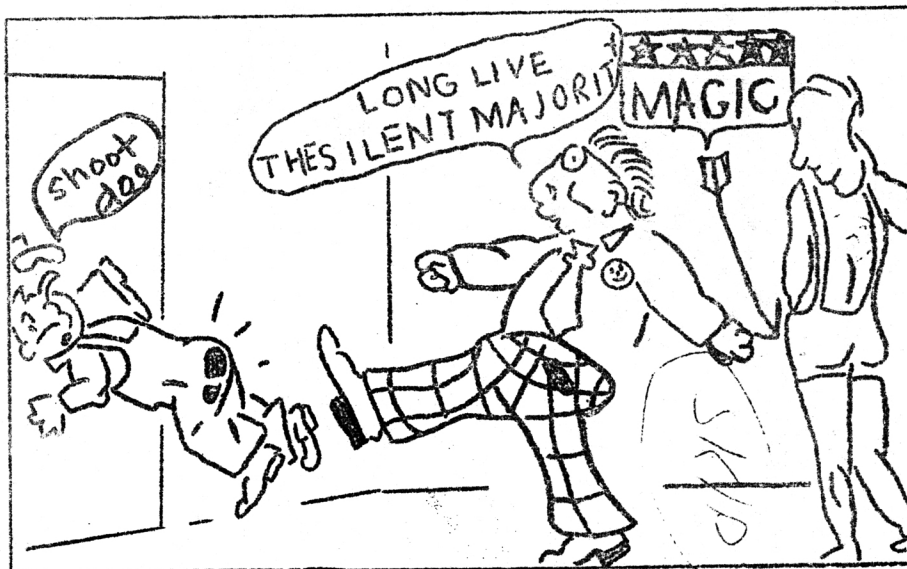
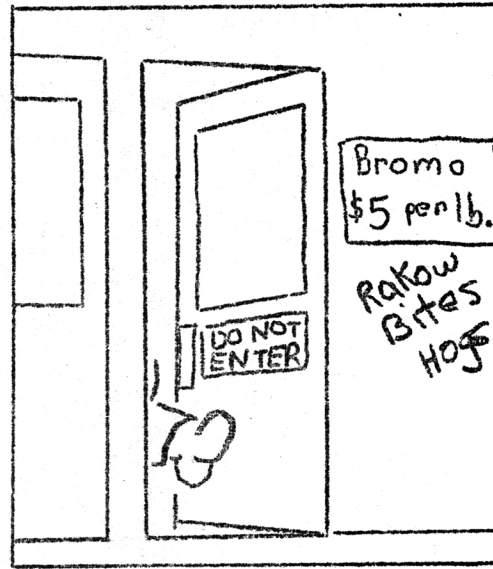
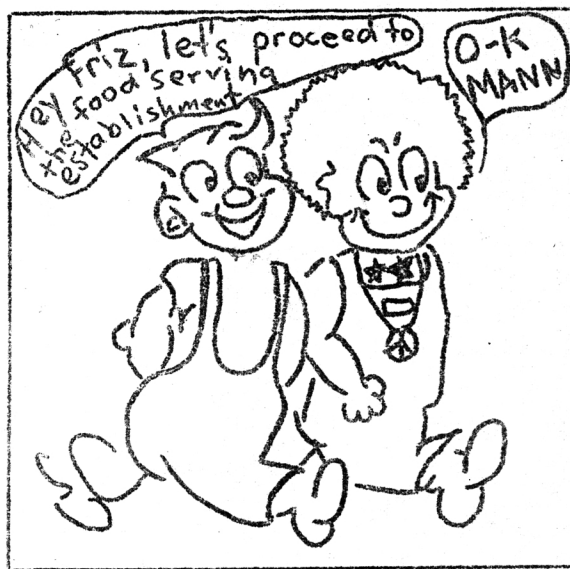
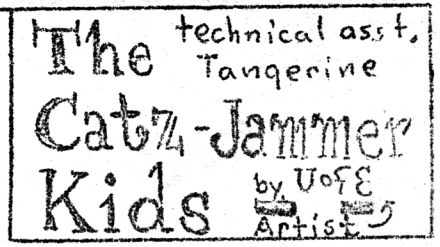
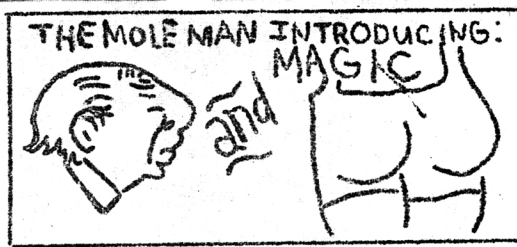
Roughly estimating there are five white students to one Black student at this high school. So, the Black students won't be represented in any of Bosse's "majority rule" elections.
