Direct Action, an activist newspaper published by Bay Area-based Livermore Action Group (LAG) from 1982 to 1986, provided the most comprehensive coverage of North American and European grassroots organizing available in those years. Free downloads are available at DirectAction.org/classic-issues/

The Action Bulletins were produced during the Spring of 1983, as part of the LAG-initiated International Day of Nuclear Disarmament on Summer Solstice. In addition to LAG's second large-scale blockade of Livermore Nuclear Weapons Lab (over 1100 arrests), more than 300 other groups around the world joined with local actions in June 1983.

The first and third Action Bulletins were printed separately. Beginning with Direct Action issue #5 in May 1983, the Bulletins were included in the tabloid paper. After July, the material was included on Local and Global news pages of DA.

INTRODUCTION



Dear Friends,

This is your Action Bulletin. The purpose is to provide a forum for people wishing to take part in actions for disarmament and social justice on or around June 20, the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament. The nature of the material, the length of this publication, and of course, the success of International Day itself, depend on your efforts.

Please send us letters or articles about your plans for International Day and the week leading up to it. We also welcome articles and letters of a philosophical and political nature exploring different approaches within the peace movement. We encourage information-sharing about the arms race and related social evils, and discussions of programs, tactics, long-range plans and organizing strategies to bring about social change. We'd like to include a broad spectrum of views and styles and to provide people with an opportunity to form new alliances within this politically and culturally diverse movement.

As this first issue of the Action Bulletin goes to press, hundreds of thousands of people in Western Europe are participating in Easter week deomonstrations to protest the manufacture of nuclear weapons and their present and proposed deployment on European soil. These weapons and weapon systems are designed in the United States at Lawrence Livermore and Los Alamos Laboratories. Many communities in the U.S. have factories that manufacture or assemble these weapons or weapon systems or have plants that process fuel for nuclear weapons.

Last week Reagan plugged the continuing "space wars" research of Livermore Labs as the answer to the peril of nuclear holocaust. Earlier in March, he again denounced the Freeze movement and warned us about the "evil empire" of the Soviet Union. Meanwhile United States unemployment continues to rise, vital social services are cut, and we expand our military intervention and our support of repressive regimes in the Third World. If there is to be an effective international movement for disarmament and social justice, millions of people in the United States <u>must</u> make a powerful commitment, must be willing to become engaged.

We hope that between now and June 20th you will make time in your lives to discuss these issues with your friends and neighbors and to help plan an action or educational event for June 20th. And we hope that all of our actions on International Day will generate many new organizing skills, new alliances, and a sense of personal empowerment and solidarity with others that will find continued expression in local, national, and international movements for peace and justice.

In February, the Chicago Disarm Now Action Group (DNA) sent out a "Midwest Call for Action to Stop the Euromissiles and First Strike", proposing that there should be coordinated actions at as many Euromissile and other first-strike weapons <u>production sites</u> as possible on June 20 -- the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament.

DNA is planning a blockade at the Northrop Defense Systems plant in Chicago. The goal is to protest and disrupt weapons production there for one working day. The Northrop Chicago division produces radar and electronic defense equipment for the B-1 and B-52 bombers, and other aircraft. DNA will be leafletting workers at the plant prior to June 20th in an effort to gain their support and participation in the blockade.

In addition, DNA is encouraging actions at several other major weapons production sites in the Midwest: Williams International, Walled Lake, Michigan (assembles the engines for all 3 cruise missiles); McDonnell Douglas, St. Louis (TERCOM guidance and navigation systems for all 3 cruise missiles); Honeywell, Inc., Minneapolis (guidance system for the ALCM, radar equipment for the SLCM, memory system for Trident); Boeing, Witchita (prime contractor for the ALCM); and Sundstrand Co., Rockford, IL (fuel boost pump for the ALCM). Planning for coordinated actions at Midwest production sites took place on March 19 at the "Great Lakes Euromissile Workshop: Organizing Opposition" in Chicago.

The first deployment of cruise and Pershing II missiles is now scheduled for December, 1983. American resistance at production sites, coordinated with European resistance at deployment sites, will be necessary to stop the missiles, and time is short. The potential for media impact of an international day is immense, and American support for the European resistance would be demonstrated. Resistance means doing more than symbolically protesting or petitioning for change. Direct action is required. This means that while marches and rallies play a role, concrete interference with "business as usual" brings concrete results.

In addition, we must make clear that we value and need the participation of military workers. In the current economic crisis, the military is an island of jobs in a rising sea of unemployment. And war, both conventional and nuclear, becomes more likely as the crisis deepens. "Defense" workers, even more than anyone else, are lead to believe that the "other side" is the only aggressor. Extensive dialogue should take place long before an action, encouraging participation or independent actions, as well as talking about the issues.

On March 19, over 80 activists from six midwestern states gathered in Chicago for the Great Lakes Euromissiles Workshop. The day-long conference was a chance for local organizers to share information and to plan strategies to prevent the deployment of cruise and Pershing II missiles in Europe this fall.

More than half of the participants accorded cas afternoon workshops to discuss ideas for demonstrations and actions at nuclear weapons production sites. The LAG/Mobilization for Survival call for actions on June 20 was placed in the context of the year-long campaign against the Euro-missiles, which will include actions in October coordinated with the European peace movement.

Those at the conference were not empowered to commit their groups to specific courses of action, but agreed to take the information back to their groups for consideration. It was a sense of the meeting that a lot of groundwork must be done with the workers in the facilities which manufacture nuclear weapons, and in the surrounding communities. We must inform the workers and the local people of our motives and intentions <u>before</u> we mount a civil disobedience action, so that they may know that neither they nor their jobs are the targets of our actions. Related to this, it was agreed that nonviolence training was an essential component of a successful action, and that the affinity group structure would be a good model to use.

Ideas for specific actions were discussed, although not all of these were finalized commitments. An action at Northrop in Rolling Meadows, Illinois is being planned by the Chicago Disarm Now Action Group. The Michigan Alliance for Peace may hold an action at the Williams International plant in Walled Lake, Michigan, where engines for the cruise missiles are manufactured. A legal rally may be held in Minneapolis/St. Paul, and in Madison and Milwaukee, Wisconsin. These last two, though, may join in an action at Substrand, Inc. of Rockford, Illinois.

Members of the Catholic Worker Community in Des Moines, Iowa will expand their traditional focus on the SAC headquarters in Omaha to include the Wellman Dynamics plant in Creston, Iowa, where the aluminum bodies for the cruise missiles are made.

A regional structure of communication is being established from contacts made at the March workshop. This network will be kept informed of the planning for June 20 and other actions, and will attempt to coordinate opposition to Euro-missiles in the Midwest.

MASSACHUSETTS

Katie Green of the Worchester (Massachusetts) County Coalition for Disarmament reports that June 20th actions in that part of the United States will focus on the nearby GTE plant. GTE is a high-tech corporation currently engaged in research and development of command, control, and communications for the MX missile.

The Worchester Coalition has held a weekly vigil at the GTE facility since before it opened nearly two years ago. The Coalition is convinced that a gala opening ceremony was abruptly cancelled because of actions like the vigil and GTE's concern about their "public image".

According to Green, as area residents have learned more about GTE's arms research, public response has been one of "silenced awe to verbalized outrage". She points out that even though high tech corporations are a significant part of the economy and that New Englanders are historically conservative about such matters, more and more citizens are joining the vigils.

The churches and religious community have been a main source of help, especially the local Catholic Worker House and the Council of Churches. Four demonstrations of 100 to 200 people and two civil disobedience actions have been held. During a CD action at GTE last December, six people poured blood, including a Catholic priest.

To LAG Action Bulletin Work Collective:

In June, Peace House of Ashland, Oregon will be sponsoring a $2\frac{1}{2}$ day educational-informational walk from Ashland to Litton Industries' Grants Pass Division, which manufactures guidance and control systems (under 100% military contracts) for, among other things, cruise missiles. The intention of the 45-mile walk through the Rogue River Valley is to awaken people in this area to the existence of a "death factory" in our backyard, of which most citizens in this area are unaware.

We will disseminate literature about cruise missiles and the deployment of these weapons in Europe, as well as general information on the arms race. There will be meetings in the evenings and along the way. The walk will culminate with a rally near the plant on Monday morning, June 20, the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament.

Since Litton is one of the largest employers in this economically depressed region, our approach in this initial focusing on Litton's role in arms-making will be informational and friendly, not threatening.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF-



Organizers in New Mexico are moving swiftly toward completing initial preparations for The International Day of Nuclear Disarmament. On Sunday, March 20, 32 active organizers were delightfully surprised to be able to count so many "ready to work" partners at their meeting in Albuquerque. At least five citizens groups were represented at the meeting and, remarkably, everyone came ready to put their own "organizational self-interest" aside to concentrate on the greater issue: Nuclear Disarmament or Nuclear Holocaust.

Kirtland Air Force Base on the south edge of Albuquerque will be the focus for the June 20th activties in New Mexico. Kirtland is reputed to be the largest storage facility for nuclear weapons in the United States and is an active combat-ready base for Tactical Air Command. Among other things, we plan to have hundreds of people make a two-day march around the entire base as a symbolic encirclement. Kind of like the logo on Pete Seeger's banjo that says something like: "This banjo surrounds hate and transforms it into love". There will be some big-time singing and several well-known speakers.

The peace festivities will actually begin one week earlier with an anti-nuclear film fest, followed by a children's picnic (with puppet shows, skits, etc.) and an art and poster exhibit. Bring your family to beautiful New Mexico and join us in our stand for life; we'd love to see you.

To all of you working to replace the nuclear madness with glimpses of sanity -- we send a kiss of New Mexico sunshine.

The Ames, Iowa Peace Network reports that it is planning an action for June 20 outside Rockwell International's office/plant in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The group has not decided the exact form the action will take. Rockwell International plays a key role in the production of the MX and B-1 bomber, and is among the top 10 defense contractors.

The U.S. plans to build about 17,000 additional nuclear warheads over the next ten years as part of its plan to "win" a nuclear war. The Rocky Flats Nuclear Weapons Plant, near Denver, is producing the plutonium "triggers" for each of the new bombs. A "trigger" is a fission bomb, similar to the bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, which is used to set off a much larger explosion in a hydrogen bomb. It can accurately be said that Rocky Flats is a vital part of the arms race.

The following Resolution to Resist at Rocky Flats has about 70 signers at present:

"In view of the short time we have left to avert a nuclear holocaust, and to demonstrate the urgency which the situation demands, I am willing to rish arrest by taking part in nonviolent civil disobedience at Rocky Flats, when I am notified that 1000 other people have signed this resolution."

On March 4 fifteen people from Colorado, who have signed the Resolution, met in Denver to look at where the Resolution presently stands, and where it might be going.

Some folks at the meeting felt that there is a need to start the action at Rocky Flats before 1000 people have signed the Resolution, in the hope of generating a "momentum" which could attract more people as the action continued. It was proposed that three beginning dates be suggested: June 20 (Livermore Action Group's International Day of Nuclear Disarmament), August 28 (Poor People's March Commemoration), or October 9 (a planned legal rally at Rocky Flats).

Some other folks felt that it would not be fair to start the action before a thousand people have signed. A suggestion was made to continue moving towards 1000 signers, while giving those who have signed an opportunity to act sooner. It was decided to ask all those who have currently signed the Resolution what their thoughts are concerning the above.

The next meeting, scheduled for April 7, has been changed to April 28, to allow more time for response. It will be at Cornerstone, 940 Emerson St., Denver, at 7:30 p.m. For more information, contact Resolution to Resist, P.O. Box 1542, Arvada CO 80001. Phone: 303/420-0439.



Hands in Peace is a project based on the vision of a nationwide network of people linking hands in a show of solidarity for peace. CALIFORNIA



A massive blockade of Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, where nuclear weapons are designed and the military application of laser and space technology is researched, will be the primary focus of Livermore Action Group's organizing efforts in the San Francisco Bay Area this spring.

With 800 arrestees now home from a nonviolent blockade and occupation of Vandenberg Air Force Base in March (organized by the Vandenberg Action Coalition), many affinity groups are ready to turn their attention to Livermore.

On April 10 the first of ten spokescouncils, meeting every two weeks until June 20, will address the following questions:

1) Should we blockade for one day or have an extended action?

2) Should some affinity groups occupy the Livermore Lab?

3) Should we establish an encampment?

4) Should we focus civil disobedience in the San Francisco Bay Area on Livermore Lab, or should we encourage nonviolent civil disobedience at several sites around the area (for example, at the University of California which oversees Livermore Lab and Los Alamos Lab in New Mexico, and at Concord Naval Weapons Station where arms are shipped to El Salvador and nuclear weapons are stored)?

Urban Ecology, a community group in Berkeley that stresses positive alternatives in a nuclear-free society, plans the following activities for the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament:

1) We will hold a special evening presentation on the relationship of ecological cities to efforts to end nuclear war threats and to disarmament in general, Friday night, June 24.

2) On a yet-to-be-selected date (probably the Saturday before or after the solstice) we plan to announce a proposal to restore the full length of Strawberry Creek in Berkeley and to establish a route for pedestrians, bicyclists and wheelchair users for the full length of the creek, including passage over the freeway to the Berkeley beach and marina area. To organize for, illustrate and celebrate the proposal, we hope to sponsor a bicycle ride from the Berkeley botanical garden to the beach and back to the new opened section of Strawberry Creek, where we will announce the proposal with other co-sponsors.

Dear Friends,

The end of last year we visited the USA and met with different peace groups. A lot of the groups we spoke to were interested in international activities. Fortunately we met the Livermore Action Group, which is organizing such an international activity, an International Day of Nuclear Disarmament. In our local peace groups, we passed a resolution supporting the idea.

We have informed about 75 West German organizations of the call for an International Day of Nuclear Disarmament and our resolution to support it. We do not know yet the kind of actions that will take place, and we do not know yet if our groups can organize civil disobediences. Perhaps there, too, will be actions like rallies or marches on the weekend before June 20th.

The actions of the civil disobediences become more and more popular in our country. On December 12, 1982, the anniversary of the so-called "NATO-Nachrustungsbeschlub" (the decision of NATO, on December 12, 1979, provides that American rockets will be stationed in West Europe not later than 1983), there were a lot of civil disobediences all over the country. In more than 40 places in the Federal Republic of Germany there were blockades in front of military installations and atomic weapons depots, nuclear weapons stockpiles and military airports, in such places as Stuttgart, Mainz, and Arsbeck.

We, too, have another idea. What do you think of "twin peace groups" between cities in the USA and in the Federal Republic of Germany? Discuss the idea and write us your opinion!

An International Day of Nuclear Disarmament is important, because:

- fall 1983 with the stationing of Pershing II and cruise missiles draws nearer and nearer;
- the preparations for the stationing of the missiles in Europe progress;
- series of tests and production of new weapons in the USA move ahead;
- money, that is withheld from the taxpayers, goes more and more into the military budget with all disastrous economical and social consequences;

The director and producers of "America - From Hitler to MX" are offering the documentary film as a participant in International Day of Nuclear Disarmament.
