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Direct Action, an activist newspaper published by Bay Area-based Livermore Action Group (LAG) from 1982 to 1986, provided the most comprehensive coverage of North American and European grassroots organizing available in those years. Free downloads are available at DirectAction.org/classic-issues/

The Action Bulletins were produced during the Spring of 1983, as part of the LAG-initiated International Day of Nuclear Disarmament on Summer Solstice. In addition to LAG's second large-scale blockade of Livermore Nuclear Weapons Lab (over 1100 arrests), more than 300 other groups around the world joined with local actions in June 1983.

The first and third Action Bulletins were printed separately. Beginning with Direct Action issue #5 in May 1983, the Bulletins were included in the tabloid paper. After July, the material was included on Local and Global news pages of DA.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT - JUNE 20-

INTRODUCTION

With the news last week of planned blockades in England and Germany on June 20, and a major march and rally in Tokyo on June 19, the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament became truly international.

Local groups have taken seriously the call to organize actions in their own areas; the protests this June will not be in New York, or Amsterdam, or Rocky Flats, or at many of the other traditional sites or wellknown nuclear weapons facilities. Instead, people are determined to protest the present military build-up at weapons factories, research institutes, military installations, and public gathering places near their homes.

Every day brings new protest news to the office of Livermore Action Group (LAG), initiators of the Call for an International Day of Nuclear Disarmament in Autumn 1982. We are printing in this Action Bulletin a full list of actions planned, as well as a complete list of participating groups, as of June 2. We will publish a summary of the actual events themselves in Action Bulletin No. 6, which will be a part of the July <u>Direct Action</u>, LAG's monthly newspaper.

To facilitate spreading the good news around the globe on June 20th, LAG is arranging a two-stage telephone communication system with participating groups. For that purpose we will have an International Day Hotline Number for four days — June 18-21: 415/549-0819 or 549-0820.

For the first communication stage, we ask each group organizing an action to phone the Hotline Number with the results of their planned activities. Groups organizing weekend rallies, marches, and other events please telephone us on Saturday, June 18, or Sunday, June 19, between 1-5 p.m. Pacific Daylight Savings Time.

Groups planning actions on June 20th, please telephone the Hotline Number as soon as you know the results of your actions. We will answer the phones from 6 a.m. to 12 midnight on Monday, June 20. If you call us as early as possible Monday morning, we will compile the information from around the world, and have a full report ready for your action followup press releases Monday night.

For the second communication stage, please try to have a person at your telephone number listed in this action bulletin between 4-5 p.m. your time on June 20. LAG volunteers



will telephone U.S. participating groups at that time to convey a complete International Day update. To save our phone bills, you may call us instead between those hours. If your group does not have a phone number listed in this Action Bulletin, please send one to us quickly.

It is very important that each local group publicize the coordinated aspect of International Day; we cannot rely on the mass media to bring us news of protests far from our local area. LAG will try to contact

European and Japanese groups by telephone so that news of those actions can also be a part of our wrap-up of June 20th.

In addition to the print media, which will be covered by each local group and nationally by the Mobilization for Survival, a Nuclear Newsreel half-hour video report of June 20th actions will be fed via satellite on June 24 and 25 to PBS television channels. The actions covered will be at Livermore CA, Albuquerque NM, Groton CT, Kent WA, Portland OR, Burlington VT, and Bonn, West Germany. People should call their local public TV stations, express their interest in viewing this report of the International Day actions, and ask what time the Nuclear Newsreel has been scheduled for viewing.

WEST GERMANY

On the twentieth of June, people from Bremerhaven and environs will carry out a nonviolent action in front of the "Carl-Schurz-Kaserne" U.S. military camp at Weddewarden.

The "Carl-Schurz Kaserne" is a logistical center for the U.S. army in Northern Germany. Among other things, at Weddewarden there are:

--The "Military Sealift Command". Aside from Weddewarden, such headquarters exist only at Yokohama, Oakland, and New York. The next level up is in Washington, D.C., itself. The "Military Sealift Command" organizes all military arms shipments that move by sea.

The deployment and stationing of the cruise and Pershing II missiles will be prepared in Weddewarden, and will be unloaded in Bremerhaven or Nordenham, if the peace movement fails to create a climate of resistance in which the NATO arms buildup is no longer politically feasible.

-A tropo-scatter radio station, which serves to control and coordinate a nuclear weapons unit.

-Bremerhaven has a history with the Rapid Deployment Force as well: in 1973, U.S. MPs blocked off the north harbor at night in fog in order to load tanks for Israel's war in the Near East. Such an event is unique so far in Europe.

The recognition that in spite of huge demonstrations, collections of signatures to petitions, and appeals, the danger of World War III continues to increase; that more and more money is spent for weapons, while more and more people go jobless, or starve in the Third World, compells us to intensify our resistance.

We have therefore decided to blockade the Weddewarden Camp to disrupt the smooth functioning of the military. In this action, we also want to give an indication of the resistance that our rulers must expect if they want to deploy new atomic weapons this fall in Europe.

We choose the form of a nonviolent blockade, because we will not take up the fight against the world of armaments through its own inhuman methods and because the means of our resistance should correspond to our goals.

Dear LAG,

We have decided to take action against Tarmac (who build the silos for the cruise missile) -- Tarmac is being boycotted in many parts of the country, after Fran De'ath of Greenham Common Peace Camp asked for action against Tarmac. We will be leafletting/spraying/writing letters concerning Tarmac before June 20th and then blockading a Tarmac office or construction site on the day -- sitting in front of Tarmac vehicles somewhere in Leeds!

We must stop the construction of silos by Tarmac (Tarmac also constructs buildings at our local ROF Barnbow, where the Challenger Tank was built) and encourage councils, etc., to boycott the company. We want to show that we want people to build for peace and real justice, not war and oppression.

Leeds is buzzing with canvassing for peace at the moment -- although we get a bit down as it is difficult to get other people involved in direct action. Seven members of Headingley Peace Action got arrested a couple of weeks ago for a protest at a lecture about military aircraft/the Falklands War which was being held at the University (they tried to hush it up, but we found out!). We went in dressed as "dead soldiers" with posters saying "We are dead soldiers -- why did we die?" and stood silently in front of the screen, on which they were showing an RAF/USAF film. Even-tually, we were "removed" by police and the audience (very violently) and seven of us were arrested without being warned first -- so much for "legality"! We had made our point, though, and after our protest the RAF won't be using the university premises anymore.

Good luck with your actions and we'll think of you when we're blockading Tarmac on the 20th.

The U.S. government is now planning to station the nuclear-armed USS Carl Vinson and New Jersey to Yokosuka, Japan in August and the Japanese government is ready to accept them. So, our rally will put emphasis on this issue. And we are inviting activists from Southeast Asia and Western Pacific countries such as the Philippines and the Republic of Belau to the rally in Japan. In the Philippines they are beginning a new strong movement against U.S. military bases in the country and Belau people are engaged in a struggle against the U.S. pressure to make the island the U.S. nuclear bases. We hope that this Tokyo rally will strengthen the ties among our movements, which are commonly trying to get rid of the U.S. 7th Fleet naval bases. Another meeting against this stationing is to be held in Yokosuka on June 26. Besides, there will be a lot of meetings and marches held in other large cities such as Osaka, Fukuoka, Kyoto and Sapporo through June.



Every year, we in Japan have demonstrations against the US-Japan Security Treaty around June 15, in memory of Miss Michiko Kamba, who was killed in the big demonstration against the treaty in 1960. This year, we will have the big rally and march in Tokyo on June 19. The date differs by a day from yours. But we completely agree to your objectives of the International Day and would like to express our hearty wish to join the world-wide action.

At first we had planned to have the rally on 12th June, but changed it to the 19th after receiving your appeal, trying to make it as close as possible to the Day. Please understand that the date should be a Saturday or Sunday in order to make a big mobilization in Japan.

The rally in Tokyo will be sponsored by an ad hoc committee consisting of about 100 groups and movements including citizens', women's, students', farmers', and religious groups for peace and human rights, and labor unions. In the beginning of May, 30 prominent figures in Japan issued a joint appeal calling for a nation-wide action in June against nuclear armament and the Japan-US Security Treaty, which refers to the International Day.

San Diego Blockade

At 7 a.m. on June 20, San Diegans will gather at the entrance of the Ballast Point submarine base at Point Loma to participate in a vigil and nonviolent blockade of the facility.

The Ballast Point sub-base is home port for more than 25 nuclear powered fast attack submarines armed with nuclear tipped SUBROC torpedoes. The Reagan administration is planning to deploy the new generation of sea launch cruise missiles on these fast attack subs. Two of these ships, the USS La Jolla and the USS Guiterro, have been test firing the sea-launch cruise off of San Clemente Island. The actual deployment of these cruise missiles will drastically upset the already tenuous global balance of nuclear weapons. This new "strategic asset" will give the U.S. government the capability of launching a nuclear attack from deep water at a distance of 1400 miles.

San Diego already has a primary role in the nuclear arms race. Kearny Mesa's General Dynamics Convair is producing the sea launch and ground launch cruise missiles. There are nuclear arsenals of bombs and missiles stored on North Island and at Ballast Point. The aircraft carriers Ranger and Constellation, based in San Diego, are equipped with nuclear weapons. Now we have the planned deployment of the cruise on the Ballast Point submarines.

A full weekend of events is planned June 18-19 to "warm up" for June 20. On Sunday, June 19, San Diego clergy are being asked to preach the message of peace through mutual disarmament from the pulpit. Also that weekend, the Federation for Progress begins its Nuclear-Free San Diego campaign. A group called Mother Jones' daughters will be leafletting the U.S.-Mexican border, while spreading the "Welcome



to America's Most Nuclear City" idea -- a play on San Diego's "Welcome to America's Most Beautiful City" theme.

Those planning to participate in the Ballast Point blockade are required to enroll in a nonviolence training workshop. This 6-hour seminar will prepare people for nonviolent civil disobedience through a series of presentations, games, and role-playing. The San Diego Trainers Collective will be offering the training for a \$3 donation any Saturday (until 6/20) at 1162 Morena Blvd., from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. For information on the Ballast Point Legal Vigil, contact Community Energy Action Network, P.O. LIVERMORE LAB BLOCKADE

As this Action Bulletin goes out, Livermore Action Group's (LAG's) first major public event for the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament is underway. A five-day film festival, including one video film night of local civil disobedience actions, has received good coverage in the local press.

CALIFORNIA

Our nonviolence preparations planned for June 4-5 have more than 100 sign-ups. Our spokescouncils to plan the June 20 blockade of Livermore Laboratory have averaged 50 spokes per meeting from various affinity groups. We are making contingency plans for an extended blockade at Livermore Laboratory on Wednesday, June 22. We don't know how many people this means will show up for the demonstration, but we do know our office is a beehive of activity, and there is a lot of interest in what we plan.

Following three more nights of the film festival and three dance benefits, the Disarmament Rally at noon June 11 in Mosswood Park, Oakland, is our next big event. Confirmed speakers include Congressman Ron Dellums, LAG peace envoy returned from Europe — Pamela Osgood, Daniel Ellsberg, and of course many others. A Cris Williamson concert on June 17 will hopefully help pay back the debts we incurred publishing the handbook for the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament. more Lab will also help raise money by finding sponsors for themselves in a blockade-athon. LAG is selling green armbands silk-screened with the International Day logo and the slogan, "I support the Livermore blockade." This is a variation on the "wear a green ribbon for International Day" idea, which we are also spreading around the Bay Area.

People who cannot leave work on June 20th are encouraged to give a percentage of their income that day to LAG; to BLACKOUT! -- shut off their power from 8-9 p.m. Monday night to show support for the blockade, or to attend the June 25 "Hands Around Livermore Lab" legal demonstration.

California peace activists are not only committing civil disobedience at five locations in the state on June 20. Many affinity groups are also determined to disrupt the first test launch of the MX missile at Vandenberg Air Force Base, recently given the go-ahead by Congress. Our best information is that the test will take place the end of June or early July. (LAG and many other California groups entered into a coalition to occupy the test site in January '83 when the launch was originally planned. When the launch was delayed, 200 people were arrested in January and another 800 in March, protesting ongoing testing of other first strike ICBM missiles at the base.)

Pt. Mugu/Ojai Action

A group of people from Ojai, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Oxnard, Camarillo, Simi, Santa Monica, San Luis Obispo, the San Fernando Valley, and Los Angeles (all in Southern California) have formed a coalition called PAM, for Peace Action at Mugu. When a cruise missile, launched off Point Mugu, crashed in the Los Padres Forest many local people came together to discuss the problems raised by the very existence of the cruise missiles.

PAM has held several meetings since the end of March, including an information/education meeting at the Point Mugu military base itself. A friendly day of outreach was conducted by the group on May 23. PAM members spoke with the workers at the base and expressed to them their concern about the escalating arms race, and the testing and deployment of cruise missiles.

On Sunday, June 19, from 1-6 p.m. there will be a rally at Plaza Park, 4th & C Streets in downtown Oxnard. On June 20, PAM will conduct a nonviolent civil disobedience direct action.

PAM members say they feel especially compelled to take action because it is from California that cruise missiles are berthed and sent around the world on ships, to be installed on U.S. military bases in Europe and carried in aircraft. Some of the cruise missiles are being produced in San Diego County by General Dynamics Convair Division. In recent months production has been stepped up to reach a scheduled deployment in Europe by December, 1983. The TERCOM computer components are from California's Silicon Valley, 40 miles south of San Francisco. They are shipped to the Point Mugu Naval Station in Ventura County for test firing before deployment.

Nonviolent civil disobedience will begin around 6:30 a.m.

WORLD FEDERALIST ASSOCIATION

The World Federalist Association of Northern California is supporting the International Day of Nuclear Disarmament, because it believes that the escalating arms race poses an imminent and unacceptable threat of destruction to all peoples.

The WFANC is one regional branch of the WFA national organization which in turn is affiliated with the World Association of World Federalists which has representation in over twenty countries around the world. The goal of the World Federalists is the abolition of war between nations with the creation of a structured and just world community. The achievement of this goal requires enforceable World Law, attainable through a Federation of nations. In such a federation, international conflicts would be resolved by political and judicial means rather than by violence, while national governments would continue to manage their own internal affairs.

While World Federation cannot be achieved overnight, we devote much of our effort to intermediate steps. We seek to reform and strengthen the present UN system and to create new functional global authorities such as an International Seabed Authority and an International Security Authority.

World Federalists advocate revitalizing the UN by improving its dispute solving machinery, a permanent peace keeping force, a more equitable voting system, improved human rights and strengthening environmental and developmental programs. We are publicizing the McCloy-Zorin Agreement

signed in 1961 by the U.S. and the USSR, setting forth principles providing for staged general and complete disarmament to be verified by an International Security Authority. These Agreed Principles were jointly presented to the UN General Assembly and unanimously adopted in December 1961 as U.N. Resolution 1722.

WFA also focuses on more immediate arms controls issues, such as backing the nuclear freeze, through an Action Alert name bank of over 6000 citizens in all 50 states, enabling them to make their views on crises, defense spending issues, etc. known to elected and other officials.

On the Northern California Regional scene, the WFA is engaged in educational activities through home meetings, public speakers, presentations in schools and media appearances. It is developing a petition for mass distribution, in liaison with other groups, calling for "War No More" and urging U.S. legislators who have not already done so to join in the "Call for Global Survival" based on the McCloy-Zorin Agreement. The "Call" has been put forth by the Parliamentarians for World Order made up of over 600 legislators in national governments of over 25 countries.

CANADA

b. The role of the Pentagon, implemented by local defense contractors and funded by our tax dollars at the expense of social programs, in these economic and social impacts felt locally, nationally, and globally
c. The need for social and econ-

omic justice as a foundation for peace d. The connections among femin-

ism, nonviolence, peace, and justice

3. To bring together women of all ages, races, classes, etc., and to connect women working on different issues, in order to exchange ideas, work cooperatively, and develop a local base for a global women's peace movement

4. To create a community of women embodying our visions of a peaceful world

To achieve these goals, their methods include:

1. A sustained, highly visible presence at the cruise missile plant, to allow time to explore the above issues and to develop relationships with the workers and community 2. Workshops, educationals, discussions, talks, printed materials, performances, rituals, demonstrations, outreach through media, street theater, etc. 3. When appropriate, nonviolent direct action and civil disobedience emphasizing a create and positive approach.

4. A sustained emphasis on the international character of this action, and regular communication with our sister camps in New York, England, and elsewhere.

Central Arizona

Fifty miles west of Phoenix, the Palo Verde Nuclear Power Generating Station is speeding toward completion. It promises to be the largest in the western world, as well as the only nuclear power plant not on or near a natural body of water. As a result of this monstrosity being constructed in the desert, our utility rates are rapidly rising. Also, much of the power to be generated by Palo Verde will be shipped out of state. We think that here in Arizona, if all the money spent on Palo Verde was used instead on solar and other alternatives, it would provide us with more clean, safe energy. We say --- NO NUCLEAR POWER IN ARIZONA!

Two hundred and fifty miles north of Phoenix, many corporations have financial interest in coal and uranium deposits that lie under the earth. To get to the minerals, up to 10,000 Native Americans are being forcibly relocated from their ancestral homes. The Dine people who live on Big Mountain (in the Navajo/Hopi Joint Use Area) do not want to leave the land they've watched over for so many generations. We support them in their struggle to remain on their traditional land. We recognize that the nuclear fuel cycle begins with uranium mining. We say --- NO RELOCATION OF NATIVE PEO-PLES! We say--KEEP THE URANIUM IN THE GROUND!

Right here in the "Valley of the Sun", various parts for the cruise and Pershing II missiles are being built. We are outraged! We say a loud NO to this local participation in global genocide. We say—NO DEPLOYMENT OF CRUISE AND PERSHING II MISSILES IN EUROPE!

Because we recognize these connections in the nuclear fuel cycle, we feel we must connect them for our neighbors and friends. The technology is the same. The arrogance that allows each of them to exist is the same.

For the past few months, an affinity group has been meeting to develop ways to express our concern about Arizona's numerous nuclear involvements. On June 19, we will arrive at the Palo Verde Nuclear Generating Station by 5 PM, for a Celebration of Life/candlelight vigil. On June 20 we will meet at 7 AM at Motorola in Scottsdale (where radar is built for Pershing missiles) to leaflet the workers. At 8 AM we will begin a peaceful march to Bechtel, 7 miles down the road. Bachtel not only is building Palo Verde, but has 1/3 interest in coal and uranium deposits on Native American land. Civil (dis)obedience is being considered as part of the activities. Vermonters Blockade GE Gatling Gun Plant

Vermont has been outspoken against the arms race and intervention in Central America. Over 180 towns have voted for a nuclear weapons freeze at Town Meetings, and the legislature has followed suit; dozens of referenda on jobs with peace and El Salvador have also passed.

Despite this, Vermonters are still complicit in the industry of death. In 1981, 64 Vermont military contractors received over \$10,000 each for weapons production. GE led the way by far with over \$141 million in contracts for manufacture of Gatling guns, in use against the people of El Salvador.

Burlington GE is the only major producer of the high-speed, multibarrel machine guns that are the basic component of virtually all the fighter aircraft in the western world. Burlington guns formed a key anti-personnel weapon in the Vietnam war, where they were used to exterminate whole villages suspected of being sympathetic to the National Liberation Front.

A March will begin June 18 at 11 a.m. and proceed through downtown Burlington past General Electric. A rally will begin at 1 p.m. at the end of the march route. Speakers include David Dellinger and Grace Paley (Vermont rally conveners) and Leslie Cagan (Mobilization for Survival and June 12 Rally staff coordinator).

On June 20th about 100-200 people are expected to participate in a blockade of the truck route to the General Electric plant to stop departure of shipments. Prior to the action, the neighborhoods near GE and the factory will be canvassed. Economic conversion potentials will be stressed to show that the action is not directed against the workers.

HUMAN CHAIN in Michigan

On Saturday, June 11 at 2 p.m. people from throughout Michigan will form a human chain around the Williams International plant at Walled Lake in protest against the production and development of engines for cruise missiles at the plant. The action is sponsored by the Michigan Alliance for Peace, a statewide alliance of groups and individuals concerned with peace and social justice.

Willams International at Walled Lake produces and designs engines for the cruise missiles which are scheduled for deployment in England and Europe later this year. The engine miniaturization in which Williams specializes makes the cruise missile possible. Without small, powerful

engines, no missile meeting the specifications of the cruise (20 feet long, with a range of 1500-2000 miles) would be possible.

The Michigan Alliance for Peace is protesting against Williams' work on cruise and other weapons of mass destruction, not against Williams per se, or against research and manufacture of miniaturized engines, or against the employment Williams provides. It is the perversion of science and industry in the service of death which is the object of the protest. The Michigan Alliance for Peace supports the conversion of Williams to peaceful, jobs-producing purposes.

On May 18, an Oakland County Circuit Court order was issued naming Michigan Alliance for Peace in an injunction against trespassing on, defacing, or preventing lawful access to Williams property.

MAP will not be stopped in its plans to organize demonstrations in the future, in particular on June 11, 1983. MAP plans no action at Williams on June 11 which is not <u>lawful</u> and <u>peaceful</u>. MAP will file a suit in court to have the order set aside.

It is our Constitutional right "peaceably to assemble" and protest against the "irreparable harm" that Williams International and others are doing to our country and the world.

IDAHO

At its April statewide meeting the Idaho state peace coalition decided to organize a concert/rally for the weekend of June 18 and 19, and to have some sort of action on June 20. The planning for the concert is moving right along. A number of musicians have been contacted and many have responded favorably. Although a proposal was made by the Groundwater Alliance to have an action on June 20 at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, the idea did not catch on and key local groups have organized local actions instead.

C.D. at Knolls Atomic Power Labs

The Working Group for Nonviolent Action at Knolls has made June 20 the focus for our local resistance, which will take the form of a rally/ demonstration (legal) on June 20 and a civil disobedience action sometime around the 20th. We have had several meetings and have reached 2 conclusions:

1) The action should not be divisive nor judgmental of the people who work at Knolls facilities. We urge actions that build bridges rather than walls; actions in which workers can be part of the process of change and protest against the arms race.

2) We need not plan a homogeneous CD action. Rather, we feel that several simple related actions might have a larger impact. To that end, we have not developed one single scenario, but have brainstormed possibilities of action. Things we have thought of include:

- conversion magician

- using bread as some sort of symbol of our resistance

- planting or giving a tree to the employees

- a non-defense employment booth (either inside or outside)

- public information center - "Walk for Life" - ask lots of people to simply take steps onto the facility

- ask for donations of food or clothing from KAPL workers to be redistributed to those in need.

- plant a garden

- pray in a restricted area - use of graphics and music.

Ideally, our risk-taking should be a way of leading those whose lives are tied to KAPL to taking their own risks against the arms race.

Japan continued

A partial translation of the appeal for June actions, signed by 30 prominent Japanese figures, follows:

American people working for peace, whom we believe are our peace colleagues, have called for an "International Day of Nuclear Disarmament" on June 20th. They are asking international solidarity around the objectives of "global nuclear disarmament, demilitarization and non-intervention, and equitable distribution of wealth and resources within and among nations."

We Japanese people have been having many actions for peace and justice every June. This June, let us have the largest movement ever for non-intervention and demilitarization. Let us make this action in June a stepping stone for continuous movement in the fall and future.

The Nakasone administration, tied firmly to the Reagan administration of the U.S. under the Japan-U.S. Security Treaty, tramples on Japanese people's efforts to maintain our principles of peace. We have to have our government abandon the Japan-U.S. Security Treaty, re-establish Japan-Korea-U.S. relations, stop militarization, and respect and maintain the peace principles of our Constitution.

Now is the time to make clear our minds and to take action. Let us begin right now to prepare for the June action.



Planning for June 20th events, including possibly a telephone blitz to Congressional representatives, is still on-going, and there is nothing definite to report at this time.
